<u>Music</u>

- 1. Tape of three different themes
 - a. Write what they feel the music is saying/describing
 - b. Describe how the music makes them feel
- 2. Write story of song
 - a. Create characters
 - b. Develop a plot
 - c. Describe setting
- 3. Music for focus while writing
- 4. Music for studying, reviewing, or quiet desk work

<u>Art</u>

- 1. Tell the story of the picture
- 2. Describe the picture in detail
- 3. Research artist and/or painting
- 4. Describe how the picture makes them feel

<u>History</u>

- 1. Make several journal/diary entries typical of a historical character
- 3. Reporter records and describes major battle scenes, political events, historical occasions
- 3. Poet writes about major public figure or event
- 4. Playwright immortalizes historical figure/event a la Shakespeare's history plays
- 5. Write a letter to your favorite historical figure
- 6. Write a letter of praise or protest regarding the handling of a major political event.

<u>Science</u>

- 1. Tell the story of an important invention/discovery from the key person's point of view
- 2. Describe in detail how to do an experiment. Then try it out.
- 3. Write a poem about nature, an invention, an experiment
- 4. Write a play/skit about an important discovery
- 5. Go outside and write a poem or a description of what they see or hear or feel.

<u>Religion</u>

- 1. Keep a prayer journal
- 2. Write biography of key religious leader
- 3. Write favorite Bible story as if they were the main character
- 4. Write poem about God
- 5. Write about key religious events
- 6. Project what the second coming will be like
- 7. Describe heaven as they hope it will be

Foreign Language

- 1. Paragraph descriptions (in that language) of their favorite place, of one of their grandparents, a pet
- 2. Translate a short poem or favorite song into that language
- 3. Write a short story in that language, or a poem of their own

<u>English</u>

- 1. All of the above!
- 2. Read a story part way, stop, have them write how it ends
- 3. Rewrite a story from a different point of view (specify)
- 4. Try writing in stream of consciousness

- 1. Provide a budget for a business or a household and have them write a story based on that information
