- "70 x 7" Jesus replied.


The King and His Servant

he went to a fellow servant who owed him a full day's wage.




He grabbed him by the throat and demanded instant payment.

When some of the other servants saw this, they were very upset. They went to the king and told him everything that had happened.




"You evil servant! I forgave you that tremendous debt, because you pleaded with me. Shouldn't you have mercy on your fellow servant, just as I had mercy on you?"

One thousand to one




A million cubic centimeter box

In God's forgiveness the heart of the erring one is drawn close to the great heart of Infinite Love.




The tide of divine compassion flows into the sinner's soul, and from him to the souls of others.
